Moving Forward: Update on Bihoro in Onagawa City, Miyagi

Since the devastating earthquake and tsunami in Tohoku, some of our members have suffered tremendously. Among them is Bihoro in Onagawa City (Miyagi Prefecture). In Onagawa, 80% of the buildings were destroyed, including Bihoro Hall and Bihoro's customers' buildings. Bihoro has also suffered from the dramatic decline in its turnover. However, thanks to the global support and members' hard work, Bihoro is rising like a phoenix. The following is

a report by Mr. Kajiwara, the president of Bihoro.

"Thanks to your support, our turnover has now recovered to the level before the quake. Currently, our major businesses are waste management, revitalization of forestry, and green space management. Since the earthquake, we are getting more jobs in forest road repair. In the future, we are also expecting more jobs in windbreak construction. Moreover, we are planning to obtain a



couple of acres of land, not only to build our office but also to start a number of activities, including gathering places for local residents, farmers market and public bathes heated with bio-diesel fuel. We need about 100,000,000 yen (1.3 million US \$) to do that."

Vocational Training and Job Creation Initiatives Are Spreading in Tohoku

As mentioned in our October issue, JWCU members have started job training programs in Tohoku region. Started in Tome City (Miyagi Prefecture), this initiative is now expanding to other municipalities as well.

The following are updates from training sites.

<u><Report from Tome City (Miyagi Prefecture)></u>



The program started in October, and as part of the training program, the trainees have started community assessment with temporary housing residents. They found needs for farmers market, transportation services, and places to learn some cultural activities. These inputs will be the great hints for the trainees to start their own businesses after graduation.

<Report from Ohfunato City (Iwate Prefecture)>

The program started, in cooperation with local NPOs and media, on November 28th with 10 trainees. This program provides skills and know-how in businesses that link the primary industry (agriculture, forestry and fishery) and community welfare. These trainees became the worker coop members when they started the program, and they are expected to launch a new business unit in April 2012.



Another job assistance program started in Fukushima Prefecture, and 2 more job training programs are launching in Miyagi Prefecture in December and January.

Nationwide Support

Chipping in to Support Tohoku

At the board meeting in May, Older Persons' Cooperative in Yamagata Prefecture (JWCU member) decided to have each worker member chip in the 1-day worth of his/her wage to finance support activities for Tohoku. Since May, its members have been visiting Ishinomaki City and Matsushima City in Miyagi Prefecture to provide activities and meals once a month.

On November 27th, the members held a festival at temporary housing in Ishinomaki City to encourage its residents. The festival consisted of activities for all generations, including

exercise programs, oral care, picture-book reading for children and tavern.

During the festival, the cooperative members also heard the residents' stories. One of them said, "I'm not ready for the winter. In this temporary housing, only electric heating devices are allowed for safety reasons. Those are supposed to be provided by the City, but we haven't received anything. And we don't know when they will be delivered." Another resident said, "This festival is great. But we have to face the fact that our unemployment insurance will expire in March. We also need to pay tax. If we only keep receiving goods, we have no future. We need to become independent."

The cooperative members will stand by the residents and are determined to keep working with them.
